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Introduction

The 30th Annual New Mexico Children's Law Institute (CLI) was held virtually from Wednesday, January 11th through Friday, January 13th, 2023, with a virtual conference pre-session Tuesday, January 10th, 2023. For thirty years, the Children's Law Institute has focused on new and emerging trends and best practices in ever changing child welfare and juvenile justice environments. Through the CLI, the child welfare and juvenile justice communities have successfully advocated for blending systems and preserving connections. Together the CLI community has learned the importance of a trauma-informed approach, acquired skills for enhancing practice, and deepened its service to children and youth by focusing on empathy and compassion.

This year's conference included 47 unique workshops that provided attendees an opportunity to cultivate awareness, empathy, and enthusiasm as we work to build and transform child welfare and juvenile justice to truly benefit those we serve. The conference planning committee made the decision to hold the conference virtually and utilize the web-based version of the Attendee Hub event platform to assist attendees in navigating the conference program and used Zoom as the online platform, through Attendee Hub, to host conference sessions. Overall attendees were satisfied with the ease of access to the virtual event.

This year CLI offered a virtual pre-session, two-part PBS documentary movie series Hiding in Plain Sight: Youth Mental Illness (Episode 1: The Storm | Episode 2: Resilience). The first episode focused on 20+ young people who provided an intimate look at what it's like to experience the symptoms of mental illness, from depression to addiction to suicide ideation. The film includes insights from families, providers, and advocates and explores the impact of childhood trauma, stigma, and social media. The second episode focused on young people, their families, and friends as they talk about how they came to acknowledge and accept the reality of their mental illnesses, their work with providers to determine a diagnosis and the treatments they received, and the added stigma of racial or gender discrimination. Throughout, the young people inspire with their resilience. After each episode, there was a panel of youth organized by the La Vida Project in Las Cruces. They brought awareness by discussing and answering questions from the audience in real-time.

Opening keynote speaker Adrian McLemore shared his experience as a youth in the system as well as his experience being a kinship guardian himself while creating an impactful, thought-provoking conversation with the audience that examined the various perspectives of 'KINSHIP' in our legal profession and how those perspectives impact youth & families. Our day two keynote speaker, Elizabeth Manley, inspired attendees in transforming children's behavioral health by sharing framework for transformation inclusive of values, culture, governance, fiscal and infrastructure shifts that are necessary to meet the challenge of transformation – moving toward a shared vision that prioritizes the experience of youth and families. Closing keynote speaker, Vivek Sankaran, moved and inspired attendees by examining how focusing our work on preserving and strengthening relationships can help transform the child protection system. Using a compassion-based foundation the session looked at ways in which we can nurture relationships with families, other professionals, and ourselves to help the system fulfill its aims of assisting and supporting families. During the lunch break participants were invited to connect with other attendees and discuss common experiences during facilitated Community Conversations. During the afternoon breaks, participants had the opportunity to move and dance during facilitated Zumba and Tai Chi sessions.

The Children's Law Institute is a multi-agency and organization collaboration, led by the Children's Court Improvement Project of the NM Supreme Court. The annual conference was planned and coordinated by the New Mexico Administrative Office of the Courts, the Center of Innovation for Behavioral Health and Wellbeing at New Mexico State University and the UNM Institute of Public Law, Corinne Wolfe Center for Child and Family Justice. Major contributors to the planning process include the New Mexico Children, Youth, and Families Department's Divisions of Juvenile Justice, Protective Services, and Behavioral Health; the NM Family Advocacy Program and representatives of the court including contract attorneys, Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), and State and Tribal Judges. Major financial sponsorship of the 2023 CLI was from the NM Supreme Court, The Children's Justice Act Advisory Group, and the New Mexico State Bar - Children's Law Section. 
Overall Conference Evaluation Report

Participant Satisfaction Survey Respondent Profile


Participants were asked to provide six ratings on four-point scale of the conference overall.

I learned new information that will inform my work with children, youth, and families.











Overall Conference Narrative Feedback Summary

Overall Organization of the Event

Overall, most respondents felt positively about the organization and implementation of the conference. Many participants noted that the conference was highly informative, inspiring, and well planned. While participants missed the face-to-face interactions, they believed the virtual conference was a suitable alternative. The opening and closing sessions were greatly appreciated by many surveyed.

Some respondents suggested clearer written instructions be provided about registration, accessing sessions and handouts.

Speaker and Workshop Content

The majority of survey respondents had positive feedback about the quality, speaker and topic variety, and structuring of the workshop sessions. Many responses indicated that the presentations they attended were educational, relevant, and informative. Some suggestions for improvement included clearly labeling the skill level of the intended audience and offering more advanced level workshops. Attendees appreciated dynamic workshops, and some mentioned struggling with workshops that were primarily lecture based.

Technology

Participants had varying opinions about navigating the digital interface and ease of use of the Attendee Hub and Zoom apps. Many respondents expressed satisfaction with the platforms used and found them easy to navigate. Others appreciated that the digital conference eliminated travel time and expenses and felt that the digital environment allowed them to be more focused on the presentations as there were no audience or environmental distractions.

A few participants expressed that they had technical difficulties and found it challenging to have to continuously log in and out. Some respondents noted that while they understood the necessity of a digital conference this year, they missed the in-person interaction and networking opportunities existing in previous years.
